Your gift to me at the start of my fifth year of ministry in service to BRUU was a 4-month sabbatical for which I am extremely grateful! I definitely feel more rested. The jagged energy that I had been feeling in my body has gone away. I feel refreshed. I was definitely able to renew and rejuvenate my spirit. Thank you from the depths of my being.

As I am reading and hearing about the November 26th shooting at Q nightclub in Colorado Springs, which left several people dead and many, many more injured, I am aware of the role that the Colorado Springs All Souls UU congregation and clergy are living out to care for the people there in the wake of this terrible trauma. Our UU congregations serve people in the times of their greatest need both visible and invisible.

Sharing about our experiences during the sabbatical during the November 13th worship service, we heard from Liesl Main and from Heather Berthold about the myriad ways that BRUU members and friends cared for each other, for our UU congregation, and for the people who live in Prince William County while I was away on sabbatical. Thank you for caring for each other and for the people in our Northern Virginia community when they are in need. You own this congregational community and you do your best to care for it in ways that ensure that it thrives.

Giving – giving back and engaging in the ritual of the give-away – is a healing practice for the giver and the receiver. I spoke about this as a lesson worth learning and living during the worship service on the Sunday before Thanks-giving weekend as we re-think the meaning of this harvest festival.

The winter holiday season is now upon us. The Christmas Advent count down has begun. Hanukkah will be here starting December 18th, followed by the Winter Solstice (12/21), and Kwanzaa takes place beginning on the 26th. It is easy to get caught up in the rush and exuberance of this time of year and forget to take care of ourselves. For some of us, this time of year is not at all a time of joy. The shorter daylight hours, the cold weather, and perhaps the memories of loved ones no longer with us or the challenges of being depressed, isolated and alone can prove to be extremely challenging. Let us be aware of how this season can be filled both with blessings as well as with struggles and with grieving. Let us be mindful of one another and continue to offer the gift of compassion and love in equal measure. Let us show that this holiday time, this winter season has gifts to offer each of us whether those gifts are in the form of family togetherness or quiet solitude and rest.

Let us make sure to care for ourselves in the midst of all the holiday celebrations.

I hope everyone had a good Thanksgiving. As I write this, Bill and I are in Charleston, South Carolina with my daughter and her family (husband, son (age 7) & daughter (age 4). I feel very blessed to be treated as an important and honored part of their family. And yes, I have a wonderful relationship with my son-in-law! I am so pleased that BRUU holds a Thanksgiving celebration for members who don't have families to gather with or who for whatever reason cannot be with family during this time. It is an important tradition to spend with family and friends.

One of the Board's focuses at this time is to assemble a team of passionate BRUU members to be involved in our Stewardship Campaign this year. If we are going to be able to sustain our BRUU community, we need to make sure that members understand the importance of this year's campaign. As members have continued to come back in person to BRUU following COVID restrictions, we have a number of vacancies in our committees that need to be filled. Some members who have been particularly taxed during this time (like our AV team) are sorely in need of reinforcements. Due to giving staff in total a \$11,000 COLA increases last year, our operating budget will now include this increase, which means we need members to increase their financial contributions. As with any family, we have several needs, and we need all members to contribute some of their time, talents, and money to our community for it to thrive.

The Board has realized that we have not acted on all of Mark Ewart recommendations to ready ourselves for a Capital Campaign. One of our goals this year will be to consider how we can best reorganize in a way that maximizes our ability to reach our mission and vision. Stewardship will need to play a more central role and some other important changes are in order as well.

#### Represent Our Congregation at 2023 UUA General Assembly!

One of our current 7 Principles is this: "The right of conscience and the use of the democratic process within our congregations and in society at larger;" it is the 5<sup>th</sup> Principle. We value democracy and democratically run institutions.

Each year our congregation holds an annual meeting to elect its leadership, to approve the budget and to vote on other matters that come before it such as by-laws changes.

Each year the Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations (the UUA), of which we are a member congregation, gathers to do the work of the Association during General Assembly (GA) in June. At that meeting delegates representing their congregation may be asked to weigh in on matters that require a vote. Some these are electing the President of the UUA, approving the budget, and making changes to the UUA by-laws (<u>https://www.uua.org/files/2022-10/uua\_bylaws\_10312022.pdf</u>). In addition, there are lots of wonderful programs and a social justice action or project.

The number of congregational delegates is determined by the size of the congregation, with a minimum of 2 delegates for the smallest congregations. At this time, BRUU is entitled to 5 delegates.

The 2023 GA (June 21-25), which is being held in Pittsburgh, PA (less than 6 hours away) – and also on-line – is going to be an especially important one for the UUA. Two prominent agenda items are:

-Election of the next UUA President: the presidential search committee has nominated Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt (<u>https://www.uua.org/pressroom/press-releases/psc-nominee-president</u>);

-First vote on changes to UUA By-laws Article II (<u>https://www.uua.org/uuagovernance/committees/article-ii-study-commission</u>): "The final version of Article II, as amended by the by Board of Trustees and/or the 2023 General Assembly, must receive a simple majority vote to move forward for a final vote at the 2024 General Assembly. It will take a 3/4th majority vote at the 2024 General Assembly, to be adopted as the new Article II of the UUA bylaws. If either vote fails, a similar proposal cannot be considered for two years."

There will be plenty of other important actions and interesting programming to take part in, but I cannot stress enough how critical the above votes will be and BRUU needs to have its voice represented at GA.

It is also critically important that we identify those who will serve BRUU early. The draft language for Article II is being considered now and at the end of January the Article II Study Commission will make its recommendation to the UUA Board of Trustees. Further revisions will occur during the spring, including mini-assemblies in May that congregational delegates can participate in before the revisions are posted to the GA Final Agenda.

**By the end of January**, the BRUU Board would like to know who will represent BRUU at GA in June 2023. Then Rev. Charlotte would support the delegates in providing education and listening sessions to BRUU members (and friends). These activities will better inform our delegates in how they can represent the feelings of the congregation alongside their own consciences.

### DECEMBER 4TH 3:45 PM - 5:30 PM


