Board Matters

Angie Carrera, President, Board of Directors

This scheduled meeting was held on March 20 at 7:00 p.m. in the BRUU Conference Room and may be available on Zoom. There was a Closed Executive Session.

At this meeting, the Board approved the February meeting minutes and the following reports (President, Membership Report, Staff Report, Program Council, DLRE Report, Office Budget Report), were unanimously approved. Please see the BRUUnet KnowledgeBase for Board Meeting minutes, as well as attachments in support of the agenda and/or the reports.

- The proposed Nominating Committee Members (Nina Lomax, Martin Crim, and Heather Berthold) and Right Relations Team Members (Mike Cleary, Zarina Credle, and Theresa Scalzo) were both unanimously approved by the Board.
- A motion made to approve the Restatement of the UUA Retirement Plan was deferred due to concerns about full compliance with the terms of this agreement. Therefore, Angie will confirm our full compliance and issue an email vote.
- John reported that HVAC installation of 2 Mitsubishi units in the Fellowship Hall began 3/18 and is estimated to be done by 3/20. However, John reports that because BRUU's deductible is \$82K, insurance won't pay for the roof repair. Just The Roof (JTR) can make primary repairs for \$18-20k leaving other work ahead. Once done, the Board will research other insurance carriers to improve our coverage.
- In preparation for BRUU's 5 delegate seats at the GA in Baltimore, the Board advises folks to self-fund this activity. For folks unable to do so, scholarships are available up to \$410 each (the cost of early bird registration). Late scholarship recipients will have to pay to pay the difference so we encourage early registration. Delegates will have to cover other expenses.

- Considering the Ministerial Search ahead, the Board has determined the need for a more in-depth interview process, an enhanced welcome from the Board, and a follow-up meeting with the new minister after 90 days' employment. The Board will select the Search Team.
- The Board prepared the Agenda for the April 6 Congregational Meeting to include reports on Infrastructure and the Congregational Survey regarding a Ministerial Search. The Board will ask for a vote on the proposed Infrastructure purchase and a proposed Ministerial Search. Power Point slides and a reminder with voting information will be made available to the congregation prior to the meeting. Per BRUU Bylaws, only members who signed the book before March 7, 2025, may vote at this meeting.
- New business: A) Membership: Angie reports that the Membership Committee has revised and enhanced the membership process. Orientation now includes a BRUU video, Bylaws, and Covenant. Ceremony now offers Welcome: a UU Primer. Applicants agree to honor our Covenant, sign a Declaration of Membership which includes commitment to pledge their time, talent, and treasure to support BRUU's mission, priorities and activities. B) Immigration issues and UUA congregations: Josh attended UUA training and he suggests resources on ICE sensitive location policy be reviewed by the Board.

Social Justice Update: Crisis Receiving Center

Progress in a Forward Direction: The Crisis Receiving Center (CRC) Is Coming

As a member of Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement (VOICE - https://voice-va.org/), BRUU has been active is advocating for state and local funding to open a Crisis Receiving Center (CRC) in Woodbridge at Potomac Mills. Governor Youngkin was impressed last year when VOICE gathered 800 people in Triangle. He supported the General Assembly approval of \$140 million to create nine CRC's across Virginia.

The CRC at the former Gander Mountain building will be the first to open in Virginia. It will have 16 beds and 16 recliners for adults, plus 8 beds and 8 recliners for youth 13 and below, starting in August/September.

Recliners are intended for short (23-hour) stays, allowing a person having a mental health episode to stabilize, obtain meds, and be directed towards longerterm care. Beds are for 3-7 day stays. The CRC will be operated by Connections Health Solutions (https://connectionshs.com/). That company created the CRC model to offer "right care in the right setting at the right time," and operates a flagship CRC in Tucson, AZ.

The Prince William Board of County Supervisors are poised to provide over \$5 million in interim funding in FY26 budget. That funding is needed until the

youth services wing qualifies for Medicaid reimbursement. The Woodbridge CRC is expected to help 4,000-5,000 people per year.

The CRC will provide wraparound services using the "no wrong door" model. Prince William County is locating community services offices and opening a pharmacy at the CRC to provide a continuum of care after discharge. The needs of patients will be identified and matched with appropriate services, including permanent supportive shelter such as Good Shepherd Housing (https://goodhousing.org/). That contrasts with the current process, where people are often discharged without any support once they leave the emergency room.

At the Adult Detention Center (local jail), 70-90% of people suffer from drug, alcohol, gambling addictions or mental health problems. Even the special psychiatric unit in the local jail ends up warehousing people. The CRC is designed to provide treatment to people.

Until the CRC opens, police and emergency services personnel will continue to carry people in need to the emergency room of a local hospital or to a jail. Mental health treatment options in emergency rooms are sparse, since psychiatric



care is not very profitable for hospitals. The CRC will have separate entrances for adults, youth, and police so the populations are not mixed.

Police chiefs have been strong supporters of opening the CRC;'s, because they will allow police officers to transfer patients into the CRC care and return to duty within 10 minutes. Currently, police offices are trapped at the hospitals for hours – often in corridors because rooms are not available - until patients are accepted into some form of medical care or discharged.

The number of overnight beds available for psychiatric care is very

limited. There is only one state treatment center for youth. It is located in Staunton, so transportation can consume a lot of overtime hours.

People dealing with mental health situations are encouraged to ensure personal safety first, then call 988. If there is a physical threat, call 911.

Local police have 40-hour Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) training, including de-escalation techniques, and have successfully talked people out of suicide attempts. Prince William County has six co-responder teams where a therapist from Community Services accompanies police, so situations can be handled by a professional trained to offer mental health services. The co-responder teams are not available 24-7, however.

Outreach efforts by the Health Department and its partners include trying to intercept people who are "frequent flyers" to the emergency room (especially those with addictions). Ideally, providers can get "left of boom" in the timeline and engage in advance of a crisis ("boom"). The county offers training to community groups such as churches, including how to administer Naxalone.

The Prince William chapter of the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI - <u>https://nami-pw.org/</u>) is an active partner with VOICE and working closely with government agencies and health care providers. The Youth Wellness Conference (<u>https://garfieldnami.org/events</u>) will be May 3, 10:00am-3:00pm at McCoart Administrative Center. If you know of someone who might benefit from better mental health services, check it out.

On May 4, VOICE and NAMI will offer another outreach session to explain how the CRC will transform mental health care locally. The event will be at Trinity Episcopal Church, across Center Street from BRUU, before the 11:00am service.

Walking Meditation Training & Practice April 3rd

On April 3rd 2025 Ann Deschamps will again teach the BRUU Sangha. Ann will teach on the topic of Walking Meditation, which is a central practice in Buddhism. Walking Meditation embodies mindfulness in motion, blending physical movement with meditative awareness. It is seen as a complement to seated meditation, emphasizing the



cultivation of mindfulness in everyday actions. We focus on the sensations of each step—the lifting, moving, and placing of the feet—anchoring their awareness in the present moment. This practice mirrors Buddhism's emphasis on the interconnectedness of body and mind, encouraging a deep sense of presence, calm, and clarity. We will explore how to apply this practice to everyday life.

The class & meditations led by Ann will start at 7:00 PM and will be in the Fellowship Hall. Please arrive several minutes before the start time of 7:00 PM. 
