

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# October Services

October 5: "Affordable Housing in Our Community" (Charlie Grymes and Dianne Lane) - Affordable housing for average income households is rare in Prince William County. BRUU is actively engaged with other faith communities through VOICE to tackle the challenge and is making progress at the local level – but what is the problem, what are the solutions, and what are the ethical/religious drivers for us in BRUU to try to solve the affordable housing problem?

# October 12: "Many Windows" (Rev. Kimberley Debus)

How do we hold diversity of belief and thought both inside our walls and out in the world? We will examine our shared value of pluralism and consider what it means to celebrate diversity in culture, experience, and theology.

October 19: "Our Immigration System: Humanity v. Law – Can We Have Both?" (Lisa Shea) - An overview of US law and policy around immigration and the effect of the same on the immigrants and US citizens.

October 26: Monster Love: Pluralism, Accessibility, and Making Room on the Broom (Rev. But what does it mean to celebrate difference and otherness in October of 2025? This Sunday join Rev. Caitlin Cotter Coillberg for a Joyously Spooky service focused on love, queerness, accessibility, pluralism, and monsters.

# From the President's Desk

You might know I used to be an actor, which means I worked in a ton of restaurants. Common across them was that to-go cups and lids were locked up. If you wanted to give them to a customer, you had to find a manager and wait for them to unlock the cabinet. The reason was that staff might drink out of them, which costs money. But by not trusting servers and disempowering them, guests got worse service. And the people who wanted to give guests the best service were the most frustrated by it!

I've been thinking about this as I watch some of our own decision-making processes at BRUU. Recently, someone brought an idea to me that would have minimal costs. It affected three committees, but it seemed like those committees were all on board. But somehow this straightforward project ended up on the Board agenda.

This happens when we don't have clear guidelines about who has authority to make which decisions. The result is that good ideas get bottlenecked and volunteers feel disempowered. And the people who most want to serve BRUU are the most frustrated by it!

# **Community Spotlight**

Speaking of those who serve BRUU, Nina Lomax has brought so much vitality and so many fresh ideas to her role as Membership Chair. I'm grateful for the work her predecessor Randy Earl accomplished in this position, and it's exciting to see Nina's energy and innovations building on it.

I'm also seeing new members get plugged into our community in meaningful ways - joining committees, participating in services, showing up for workdays. This engagement happens when people understand how they can contribute and feel empowered to act. I want you to know that whether you've been at BRUU for 20 years or 20 minutes, there are opportunities for you to share your talents here.

# Charter Fest '25

Here's my proposal: Charter Fest. An event where every committee comes together for one (part of a) day to create or update their committee charters. These documents spell out each committee's purpose, authority, and boundaries with other committees. Some committees have a recent charter, some have an ancient one, and some have none at all.

Think charters are the most boring thing imaginable? They're not! (The most boring thing imaginable is The Silmarillion. Come at me.) If you've ever wondered "who is responsible for that?" or "who is in charge here?" or "can our committee do that?" then a charter is for you. As charters get older, they lose touch with reality, eventually becoming relics deep within BRUUnet.

Charter Fest would be a community event - one day together at BRUU with food and fellowship. We'd provide templates to make the work manageable and consistent. Committees with existing charters would bring them for updating; others would create new ones. Dare I say it might even be fun?

Planning for Charter Fest has only barely begun, so please stay tuned for more! If you have an idea about how to make this more effective, please let me know.

## **Your Role**

If you serve on a committee or team, start thinking about what authority your committee or team needs to do its work effectively. What decisions currently get delayed by unclear processes? What boundaries with other committees need clarification? Review any existing charter documents and think about what updates are needed.

If you don't currently serve on a committee, consider this an opportunity to understand how BRUU operates and where you might want to contribute.

# THE BIBLE IS A SLIPPERY SLOPE

The Bible is revered by millions as a "Holy Book", proven wisdom and, to some, infallible. If you are not one of those millions, then why would you be interested in joining BRUUers who fill the Flamingo Lounge every first Sunday at 9:00AM for BRUU's Biblical Discussion Group? (BDG)

Here's why: They know that the Bible is filled with strange stories and they know it's impossible to unravel the meaning of all of its passages without help from somebody who's studied its contents as well as the history of its development. In BDG, Martin Crim does just that. Over time, class attendees have come to understand that if you don't know how the Bible was developed over the centuries and what certain passages mean in the context of their time, then you are on a slippery slope in trying to understand the Bible.

Martin is well read in Biblical history. His Dad, Dr. Keith Crim, was a Biblical scholar who took advantage of his son's "free kid labor" in helping him organize his research notes for his next book. As a result, Martin's fascination with Biblical history never waned and he continued to read about Biblical history. Today we BRUUers are the lucky inheritors of his knowledge. In BDG we learn the context in which the Bible was developed — the traditional thinking of the time, the myths and legends familiar to Middle Easterners, and insights into interpreting the Bible's strange stories, such as the Garden of Eden and Jonah and the Whale.

If you are thinking that the purpose of BDG is to sell Christianity, you will find that's not the case. BDG's group study is a way for BRUUers to look at the Bible's passages and stories and make sense of them. In the process, you will also learn that understanding the Bible can be a slippery slope, no matter how sincere you may be in considering Judaism or Christianity as religious thinking that you might decide to adopt for yourself. 

Join us on the 1st Sunday of every month in the Flamingo Lounge (11:30-1:00).




