## ·C'mon, Join the BRUU Housing Study Group BRUU Housing Study Group Starts August 15

Members of BRUU's Social Justice Committee at the June 28 meeting of Virginians Organized for Interfaith Community Engagement endorsed the decision to make affordable housing one of VOICE's top three priorities. It's a complex topic, so VOICE decided to establish a study group before recommending solutions in 2023.

At BRUU, "ditto." Social Justice Committee is creating our own housing study group, so we understand the choices plus the pros/cons of different options. Being better prepared will help us speak out with more confidence at VOICE and other public meetings. As we understand the housing problems better, we may discover that the easy/simple solutions will not be adequate. Because 2023 is an election year, now is the time to push for more than token action.

What are the realistic options for addressing the housing challenge in our area vs. what would be a waste of time to propose? Where should we focus? The answer for most of us is "ugh, don't know yet – but know how to get there from here. Get together with others and share the homework."

BRUU is starting a study group to research and discuss the options for creating more-affordable housing in NOVA. This is in parallel with VOICE, so we can contribute and discuss the issue more effectively. Study group will meet on the third Monday of the month from 7:00-8:00pm, starting August 15.

I hope everyone is staying safe and cool in this brutal weather! We are in the thick of summer now with temperatures rising to possibly 100 degrees tomorrow! At least we are expecting and have been getting a fair amount of rain. Lately I have been feeling like we live in the tropics! I'm half expecting to hear monkeys hooting in the trees!

Bill and I decided to go to the Farmer's Market as early this Saturday morning to beat the heat. As usual we saw Mary Kadlubowski working at one of farmer's booth. I hope she is going to be OK being out for the remainder of the market. We also ran into Randy and Trish Freed who were shopping and were delighted to hear Jen Deavers sing *Let's Stay Together* with the band that was playing at the market. I love going out into our community and running into BRUU members! It makes me feel more a part of my community.

Top of the list of things to accomplish is weekend is getting ready for my trip to Spain. I will be joining my niece and grandniece at Reagan International Airport (they are coming from California) and we will be flying into Barcelona at the end of July. After spending 4 nights there we will be traveling via train to San Sebastian. Traveling via train is so cheap in Spain! It cost only \$225 for the 3 of us to travel to San Sebastian, which is an almost 5-hour trip. And that's for first class! Temperatures have been reaching record highs In Spain, as is happening across Europe. However, it looks like they will be back to normal temperatures for the time we will be spending there.

The courtyard doors are finally in place and have been newly painted again and the windows de-taped! Many thanks to John and Christian Sunda and Margaret and Carl McCulla for their work on this project! Check them out, they look pretty fine!

We had another HVAC system fail, this time the one that cools the upstairs of the commercial building. Window units have been used as a temporary fix until we can replace the system. We have Mike Freeland to thank for getting the window units installed in the commercial building. And again, we have John Sunda to thank for getting estimates from 3 different vendors to replace this system and giving us his expert advice on which vendor to choose. The board is in the process of an email vote as I write this report. I trust that everything will be in order soon. The cost of this unit is much less than the one we recently replace in the BRUU building, it will cost around \$7,000.

The Board approved of Michelle Luman, Chris Sexton, Dorothy Greenhouse, Bill Stejskal, and Kelly Muzzin to be on committee for the search team for the interim Music Director. It will be a difficult to replace our wonderful Music Director, Annease Hastings, but it is good to know we have people interested in devoting their time and energy into making good decisions regarding how to attract and chose an interim Director. Music is an important part of our congregation, so this is kind of a big deal.

Efforts have been made to reach out to members who have not contributed to BRUU, but the amount of incoming pledges from the time of our Annual Meeting have not moved the bar much. We had several people who spoke passionately about the importance of paying for cost of living raises for staff, so I hope that some members will be increasing the pledges they have already made. We will also be looking for a group of people to work on how to fund the Infrastructure Budget. Please look for the information that will be coming out in RoundUp and Crossroads soon and apply for this ad hoc committee if you think you have ideas or the skills that needed for this committee.

Along with several members of BRUU, I spent a glorious week last month in the mountains of North Carolina at SUUSI (the Southeast UU Summer Institute). Our theme this year was Gratitude, and that spirit of gratitude was present everywhere – from folks helping each other move in and out of the dorms we stay in, to holding doors, to exploring the ideas in worship and workshops, to the applause and praise we heaped upon performers.

So many times we get lost in our heads thinking about the past and the future and in doing so, we betray the gift of the present period gratefulness that ties us together, the only moment that really matters."

This August, as we explore in worship ways to bring life back to our tired spirits, I invite you to consider gratitude in the every day. Maybe you are grateful for the cucumbers growing in your garden, or the existence of grocery delivery services. Maybe it's the gathering of folks to play music, or play games. 
## A NEW SECURE DOOR TO THE COURTYARD

## Dear Fellow BRUUers,

I was blessed this week by a visit from my daughter, Renee, and her family, her husband Lane and their two children, (my grandchildren), Braeden and Teagan (ages 6 and 4). This is the first visit they have made to my house since the beginning of the pandemic. It was a bit of a challenge keeping up with the activity level of these very active children, but it was a constant joy to see their carefree and whole-hearted engagement with life. Their amazing imagination, their desire to be loved, their drive to face challenges and master tasks were just some of what was enjoyable to witness.

Though not as vibrant, it has been a joy to see the engagement of people to our beloved community. Being the President of the Board has allowed me to witness the inner workings of our congregation...the dedication and care with which fellow Board members have demonstrated in overseeing BRUU business; the time, effort and skill with which members contribute to the numerous tasks that we have identified as being important; and the hard work of the staff in providing quality Sunday services and Religious Education.

As a Board we have some major achievements this year: the relocation of the food pantry, the replacement of a major HVAC system, the reopening of the sanctuary, the revision of the Ministerial Agreement, the completion of the Ministerial Assessment, and the creation of job descriptions for some of the Board positions. As a congregation we have also had some major achievements: the revised process for the food pantry, the replenishment of our Community Emergency Fund, the Avion Project (the updating of our AV systems), the virtual auction, the accomplishment of our fist outdoor service on Easter Sunday. And let's not forget that BRUU was recognized this year by the Faith Alliance for Climate Solutions with the Sustainability Champion Award in the Faith Community Category!

## PRESIDENT'S REPORT JULY REPOSTING

As important as it is to recognize and celebrate our accomplishments, it is also important to identify areas that need improvement. One area the Board needs to address is the identification of a team of people to accomplish our Stewardship drive. This year our pledges to BRUU fell a bit short and one reason for this was the Finance Committee stepped up to the plate to do double duty because no one else stepped forward to accomplish this task. While most of our membership made their pledges and many increased the amount they pledged, many of our new members were not contacted directly and some of our established members did not pledge. The Membership Committee is in the process of contacting members who have not pledged. As demonstrated by the congregation in the Annual Congregational meeting, it is important to our congregation to take care of our staff by providing COLA raises.

At the same time, it is important that we have a balance budget and that we continue to follow our fiscal guidelines, like not reaching into our reserve funds unless we are faced with an unplanned expense.
