

What a beautiful sendoff we had for Annease! The group who planned the Appreciation Celebration did such a wonderful job. And as always, there were several hands working the program. It was a very fitting celebration for someone who has contributed so much to the mission of this congregation. We have been very fortunate to have had such a top-notch professional as our Music Director and for as long as we have had her. She is a very talented pianist, singer, and director. She has also been an excellent employee...dependable, well-organized, thoughtful, hardworking and creative. Her departure in many ways marks the end of an era for BRUU. She is very desiring of a rest, or at least a break from her music director responsibilities. I am sure she felt the love that this congregation has for her. We all wish her well and hope she will grow into her retirement.

And very soon we will have a new Interim Music Director. His name is David Maley and he starts on January 8th. I have only talked briefly with him on the phone, but he is very excited for this opportunity and is looking forward to working with us. I am sure the congregation is also eager to meet him and welcome him to our beloved community. The board is very appreciative of the work that the Interim Music Director Search Team did in finding David. Who was on the team? Kelly Muzzin, Chris Sexton, Bill Stejskal, Dorothy Greenhouse and Michelle Luman. This Interim period of time will last 18-month and will give us some time to experiment and explore what direction we would like the music program to take.

We are getting closer to making a decision regarding the repair work that is needed on our stained-glass windows. We have had several setbacks. But the assessment has been completed by Scottish Stained Glass and the board has had an opportunity to have a Zoom meeting with the head of the company to go over this assessment. There are 2 other companies we are looking at to complete the final work. This may be a project that will take several years to fully complete. Once again Christine and John Sunda's contribution to this project has been invaluable.

As promised, the Board is working on ways to fund the infrastructure budget so that this can be decided on at our Annual Congregational meeting. This is no small dilemma and indeed is proving to be very challenging. I recently had the pleasure of talking with Mark Ewert, the UUA stewardship consultant we worked with a couple of years when considering the possibility of starting a Capital Campaign. I am thinking this very well may be the time to initiate this process, which takes two years. I was very impressed with Mark's knowledge and his commonsense approach. We have planned for the Board to meet with Mark mid-January. So, stay tuned.

By the time this newsletter is released Christmas and New Year's Eve will be behind us.

So, I hope that everyone had a wonderful and safe end to 2022. Now on to the new year, 2023!

Liminal Time

With the official retirement at the end of December of our beloved music director of 35 years, our congregation is moving further into what is known as a liminal time. This is an in-between time; a transitional time. It began when we learned when Annease would retire, but it will continue as we begin our relationship with the new parttime interim music director, David Maley.

So, we find ourselves on the threshold of something new, something different. Consultant and author Susan Beaumont describes liminality as "a place of extreme disorientation that people have a tremendous longing to get out of, and there is always a tremendous yearning in liminality to either go backwards to something that felt more stable or to leap forward to something that feels more resolved."

We've all had some practice with living in liminal times and embracing liminal space over the past two-and-a-half years thanks to the COVID-19 pandemic! Liminal space is not "problem solving space." There is untapped potential lying in wait; we are "between [our] old comfort zone and any possible new answer" according to Richard Rohr.

Rest assured that this is a rich time that will allow us to "rediscover a lot about [ourselves] and to become highly creative." In this time of unknowing, in our specific situation, we need to be open to a new kind of music program. We will be engaging in intentional discernment and listening together as we explore new possibilities for BRUU's music program.

The following chalice lighting words by Summer Albayati paint a picture in words about how we can embrace this season in the life of our congregation.

The Green Team is organizing a SPECIAL FIRST DAY HIKE


Start the New Year with a hike guided by Prince William County historians around Bristoe Station Battlefield Heritage Park.
