

### Faithfully Becoming

### Rev. Charlotte

I am writing this newsletter column on the morning of my last full day in Pittsburgh, PA at the Unitarian Universalist Association's 2023 General Assembly; before I offer some reflections on this week, I want to express some gratitude.

First, thank you for your care and concern of me when I fell during a volleyball game at the annual BRUU picnic and afterwards, too.

Second, I am – and *yinz* (that's a Pittsburgh expression that is equivalent to y'all) are too whether you are aware of it or not – extremely grateful to a handful of people who have moved into the gap left by the resignation of Tina Cox: primarily Rita Romano, Terrie McClure, Angie Carrera, and Mike Freeland. Cathy Ring, Heather Berthold, Robin Fegeas, and others have also responded quickly and efficiently to the changes that occurred. I could not handle all of what needed attending to on my own during the first two weeks of June and I was not in the office the second half of the month. Please, make it a priority to thank these BRUU leaders for their commitment and care of the congregation during this time of transition. We are stronger together and it's showing up as we navigate the liminality brought about by the changes.

Faithfully becoming. That is the theme of this year's GA. And it is a theme that we at BRUU will carry forward into and through the 2023-24 church-year.

I, of course, have been in Pittsburgh for the UU Ministers Association annual professional meeting called Ministry Days. I arrived on Sunday afternoon because I had enrolled in a continuing education course offering: Healthy Boundaries 201 – Beyond Basics. Boundaries are a gift; they are "what allow us to love each other at the same time." While this course is designed for clergy and spiritual leaders, we all need to maintain healthy boundaries as part of our commitment to being (becoming) a **safer** congregation for everyone who participates in our community whether through seeking or service.

At the end of Ministry Days is a 200+ year-old tradition called "The Berry Street Lecture." Open to all, it is delivered by a respected UU minister and the topic typically offers a critique or a wake-up call. This, I feel, is especially true of this year's lecture delivered by Rev. Cecila Kingman reflecting on "...Facisms Without and Within." I expect us to screen the Berry Street as an ALE offering sometime in the next several months, so that we might all be aware of the dangers in and around us.

## MINISTER'S REPORT

And then there is the 2023 General Assembly, which has required the attendees to embody "faithfully becoming" throughout the week as we have done the business of our Unitarian Universalist Association of Congregations. As you know from the sermon series I led, starting last December and culminating in the June Music Service, the UUA has been engaged in a required bylaws review process. In this case, it has entailed extensive proposed revisions to the whole of Article II of the UUA's bylaws where the Principles and Purposes – including the 7 Principles and the 6 Source – are found. So, this week, much of the work of the delegates has been around the proposal from the Article II Commission. As of this writing, I am pleased to report that the GA delegates voted to adopt the proposal with some amendments for a year of study. The Article II issue will come before the 2024 GA for a stipulated 2<sup>nd</sup> vote which requires a supermajority to faithfully become part of our denomination's bylaws for the next 15 years (or less).

Other important matters that came before the GA were voting for new leadership. I can report, as of this writing, that Rev. Dr. Sofia Betancourt has been elected to a 6-year term as UUA President. The GA delegates did not affirm the business resolution brought forth by the Young Adults, which asked that the UU Common Endowment Fund divest of fossil fuel stocks/bonds and make reparations for environmental impacts and injustices. It was not that we don't care about these problems, but rather that the proposed resolution's stipulations were not felt to be the most responsible way to address them. And, finally, GA delegates admitted and approved the adoption of three Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs); these ask us to speak out and take action on the following matters of concern: halting the building of "Cop City" in Atlanta, organizing for health equity, and protecting Dreamers (DACA recipients and others) with a real path to citizenship.

BRUU's 5 delegates (Martin Crim, Margo Davies, DeeJaye DeJaye, Michelle Foster-Fegeas and Cathy Ring) along with Kristin and myself plan to actively engage the congregation in faithfully becoming informed about all of what we learned as well as living into the provisionary Article II bylaws language.

I would be remiss if I didn't make note to you of another way that BRUU's delegate team participated in and embodied "faithfully becoming" this week. Along with the above-mentioned delegates, Alex Davies came to GA and participated in the Youth caucus. Alex "bridged" at GA from Youth to Young Adult during the annual Synergy Bridging service. And Michelle Foster Fegeas was among the Young Adults receiving the newly-bridged young adults on the other side of the stage. This, as far as I know, was a first for our BRUU congregation!

I am so pleased to serve as your minister.

### Policy of No-Contact for one year for departing employees

The BRUU Board requested a yearlong no contact period with Tina Cox because we thought it was important to treat the Administrative Assistant position as a professional position that was on par with the other professionals we employ. The minister, DRE and Music Director and related positions do call for a one-year period of no-contact. However, upon close consideration of the Association of UU Administrators Code of Professional Practices, it appears that there are different recommended guidelines for these administrative positions. We have also received guidance from Megan Foley at the UUA regarding this matter.

Based on our review and discussion with Megan, we have decided to withdraw our requested period of no contact with Tina Cox. We are instead requesting that the Personnel Committee create a policy to address staff departures for each of the positions that exist here at BRUU. The Personnel Committee may seek input from congregational stakeholders regarding the content of this policy.

## CLIMATE CHANGE UPDATE

All 24 jurisdictions in the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOG) <u>agreed in 2020 to cut greenhouse</u> gas emissions by 2030 to 50% of the 2005 level.

MWCOG has completed inventories for each of those jurisdictions. Now, any advocate of sustainability can measure progress - or lack of progress - by looking at numbers.

But where are the numbers? Prince William County is preparing a Community Energy and Sustainability Master Plan (CESMP), and the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Scenario is available for review. Randy Freed chairs the county's Sustainability Commission, and he can add more details - just ask..

Manassas has a task force working to draft a climate action plan. Mike Freeland is on that task force, and you can see about its activities <u>online</u>.

At the moment, Manassas Park has not started to draft an action plan to meet the 2030 target.

## **Action Alert**

Tell Congress to Advance a Climate-Smart Farm Bill In 2023



We have a critical opportunity to advocate for a climate-smart agricultural sector that advances justice. The five-year proposal now being drafted offers the chance to reduce hunger, promote environmental stewardship and promote fairness to all farmers and farmworkers. Our UU values call on us to advocate for a Farm Bill that brings about fairness, especially to farmers and farm workers of color who have been left out of earlier bills, and that encourages production of sustainably grown, healthful food rather than commodity crops grown in ways that deplete soil and pollute our waterways.

The current Farm Bill expires on September 30, 2023, so both the House and Senate are actively working on drafting a new five-year Farm Bill.
