


# **Board Matters**

### Angie Carrera, President, Board of Directors

This scheduled meeting was held on May 15 at 7:00 p.m. in the BRUU Conference Room and may be available on Zoom, There was a Closed Executive Session.

At this meeting, the Board unanimously approved the April meeting minutes and the Consent Agenda including the following reports (President, Membership, Staff Coordinator, Program Council, DLRE). Attachment: a new Roof proposal. Please see the BRUUnet KnowledgeBase for Board Meeting minutes, as well as attachments in support of the agenda and/or the reports.

- Town Hall Review: The consensus of the Board was that the meeting had gone well.
- The Roof: After discussion about a possible contract with another roofer with a 30-day deadline, the Board determined that it would not pursue any contract without more information. John will provide follow up.
- Nominations: Possible appointments for Chair positions and term limits were discussed. Art will update the Organizational Chart on KnowledgeBase.
- Right Relations Team: This newly formed team will conduct a congregational assessment through conversations with leadership, including the Board, to assess the environment at BRUU and how we address issues. Arrangements will be made as soon as possible.
- Minister Recruitment: A list of potential search team members has been compiled and several names have been contacted.
- Congregational Meeting: Board discussed agenda and preparations for the meeting. In the absence of the Treasurer, the Board will obtain the Budget draft as soon as possible, so that a vote by email for approval could be

# General Assembly 2025!

Delegates to GA this year will be voting on two important Social Witness Statements – steering the direction of our national faith.

The UUA makes two different types of social witness statements: Statements of Conscience (SOCs), which arise from Congregational Study/Action Issues, and Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs).

Congregational Study/Action Issues (CSAIs) are issues selected by Unitarian Universalist member congregations for three years of study, reflection and action. In the third year of this process, delegates at GA can vote to approve a Statement of Conscience (SOC) resulting from three years of congregational feedback on the CSAI.

### The 2025 Congregational Study Action Issues (CSAI) are:

- Abolition is Faith Formation
- Fat Liberation: Building Justice and Inclusion for Larger Bodies
- Housing: Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion

**Actions of Immediate Witness (AIWs)** express the conscience and carry the authority of the delegates at the GA at which it is passed. AIWs are initiated by individual delegates and move through their entire creation and adoption process during a single GA.

# BRUU Sangha

### **Teachings On The Opportunity of Distraction**

Buddhism teaches that distractions in everyday life are opportunities to cultivate mindfulness and develop a deeper understanding of the mind. Distractions often arise from the mind's habitual tendencies toward craving, aversion, or restlessness. Buddhism encourages observing them with awareness rather than reacting impulsively. Through practices like mindfulness meditation, we learn to gently bring attention back to the present moment whenever the mind wanders. The teachings emphasize patience and compassion for oneself in this process, recognizing that distractions are a natural part of human experience. By understanding the impermanent and fleeting nature of thoughts and external stimuli, we can reduce their attachment to distractions and focus on what truly matters. Ultimately, Buddhism views distractions as valuable teachers, guiding individuals toward greater clarity, calm, and insight into the nature of reality. We will discuss how distractions can be helpful teachers and assist in deepening our practice.

# Fixing Up Our 100-Year Old Building

John Sunda has led recent major projects to upgrade the heating and ventilation (HVAC) system. There are now 5 new heat pumps in the courtyard. The units, installed between 2022-2025, are roughly 200-300% more efficient.



The new heat pumps have allowed BRUU to turn off a broken boiler, one of the two in the boiler room next to the unisex accessible bathroom on the First Floor. That boiler produced steam heat for the radiators in the Sanctuary, plus first floor bathrooms and hallway just outside the office. At some future date, many of the now-useless radiators will be removed.

The most recent project was replacing the 1988 air conditioner which cooled the Fellowship Hall. It had been slowly leaking coolant for several years, and finally quit working last fall. John got it replaced in time to ensure air conditioning for rentals that were scheduled this Spring.

Back in 2019, BRUU completed a similar conversion of replacing a ducted AC system with a ductless heat pump system. That heat pump, on the west wall outside the Conference Room, now powers the mini-splits that heat/cool four rooms.

The mini-split units in the Conference Room and kitchen are clearly visible. The mini-splits in the BRUU office and the minister's office are hidden above the ceilings.

What's next? One boiler remains operational in the boiler room. It uses fuel oil to heat water (not steam) which is pumped into rooms in the Education Wing for winter heating.

Education Wing rooms are cooled in the summer now by air conditioners placed in individual windows. The units are removed each Fall and stored in the attic. It's a pain in the back to move the heavy air conditioners around.

Special donations funded this upgrade of old infrastructure. When this HVAC project is completed and that last boiler is finally retired, BRUU will no longer need to move air conditioners each year or to buy fuel oil. That will reduce BRUU's operating costs, work day headaches, and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

BRUU installed a tankless hot water heater after we purchased the building. It is a highly efficient way to provide hot water to bathrooms and the kitchen. The hot water heater, like the stove in the kitchen, uses natural gas as the energy source.

### **Heat Pumps Make Space For to Solar**


The boiler room could become home to inverters of solar panels – but going green is complicated.

Green Team evaluated the potential of adding solar panels at BRUU. The roof over the Education Wing could support panels, but the investment would not be cost-effective.

Like residential properties, BRUU pays for the total energy used (in kilowatt-


hours) every month. However, the Manassas city-owned utility system bills BRUU as a commercial customer. That means we also pay a power charge based on peak demand during the month, defined as the highest 15-minute use in kilowatts. Over 60% of our total annual bill is for this peak demand.



No matter how much solar panels or a geothermal system might lower the monthly electrical energy used at BRUU, it wouldn't necessarily reduce our peak demand, and this significantly reduces the potential savings of such a system. The Green Team looked at the costs vs. benefits of building a new solar system (including the value of federal tax credits). It recommended not installing solar at this time, and instead continuing to purchase carbon credits to neutralize our carbon footprint.

The membrane roof over the Education Wing is expected to last into the mid-2030's before needing major repair or replacement. The roof over the Sanctuary is nearing the end of its service life and has a minor leak in the corner near the elevator. The leaking portion will be repaired in mid-2025. BRUU is planning to replace the sanctuary roof in the next 2-3 years. The flat roof replacement time would be the logical moment to install solar panels, if the cost-effectiveness improves by then.

A major challenge faced by BRUU and the Building and Ground committee is securing funding for the upcoming HVAC and roof replacement projects. We are fortunate that our building mortgage will be paid off soon in 2026, freeing up about \$27,000/year in our budget, but more than that amount will be needed up front.

On June 8, 1:00-3:00pm we will explore the upper reaches of Broad Run (downstream from Lake Manassas). It's a 3-mile hike in the shade, on a flat trail with an uneven surface in a few spots. Well-behaved dogs on leash are welcome.



We'll cross Rocky Run upstream of where a new bridge will be installed this Fall. The old bridge, installed in 2014, was later washed out by a flood. We will walk along the edge of Broad Run on the Broad Run Greenway – see map at




