committee drafted and refined an aspirational budget over the past two months and gave it to the BRUU Board of Directors for approval.

Now, it is your turn to participate in our annual endeavor to support the congregation's mission and vision. BRUU has been a success for over 40 years now, and it has been so because the people who have been and are its members – the people who make up this beloved BRUU family – have given of themselves by volunteering and by supporting the budget through financial contributions. You make a difference in the life and ministry of this congregation.

BRUU has actually fared remarkably well during the past two years of COVID-time. Good stewardship and careful financial management have been a key to this. We were able to cut facilities costs... We had a very successful auction in November 2021... Some contributions actually exceeded the amount pledged. All this and more, means that income has exceeded expenses more months than not.

As you no doubt are aware, costs have increased over the last year. We've also committed to providing multi-platform worship services in order to reach the greatest number of people and meet the wide range of needs brought on by helping people at greater risk to stay safe and healthy. BRUU has been striving to provide fair compensation to all staff, and we recognize that we may be better served by hiring additional staff or replacing contract services with employees. Deferred maintenance and replacement costs for building systems such as boiler and HVAC upgrades, stained glass window renovations and protection and a lot more, some of which we can no longer put off, are catching up to us.

It's up to this generation of BRUU Members and Friends to support the congregation so it will be around for another 40 or more years. We are responsible for making sure that there is a safe community for seeking and service here in Manassas seven generations into the future.

I wonder how many leprechauns we've got in the congregation who might share a portion of their wealth with us for fiscal year 2022-2023? Let's all make that pot o' gold overflow with generosity!

REOPENING UPDATE

Description:

Establishing BRUU's "new normal" on Sunday mornings is still a work-in-progress. There are 35 or so members sitting in the pews while others continue to join online. Live streaming services will continue to allow BRUU to continue its outreach to members, friends, and new connections.

New cameras, computers, and other upgrades are being installed in the building. Lots of lessons are being learned; something new goes wrong every week. If you can, the volunteers on the AV Team would welcome you as a volunteer to troubleshoot problems in advance. No experience is required — just a willingness to learn and serve BRUU.

There is now coffee in the Fellowship Hall after Sunday Services. Jon Kostik is Brewmeister, and searching for members to serve on *Kitchen Krew* so we can expand to add snacks. Soup Sundays are on the horizon – or is that just a mirage? It's hard to tell with COVID.

One possible date for welcoming general public back into Sanctuary is April 7, depending upon reopening metrics, which include ICU capacity, death rate, and other oh-so-pleasant statistics. Choir is beginning to practice in-person again and performers are performing live on stage, but the time for the congregation to sing again from the pews is still unclear.

Dear Members and Friends,

Thank you again for all of you who attended or sent in proxies for the Special Congregational Meeting on 2/13! It was heartwarming to know that our membership is invested in our beloved community. We easily met our quorum, even though it took a long time to determine this. Obviously, it was one of those lessons learned from providing a dual platform meeting.

Work has begun and is almost completed on the HVAC replacement the congregation voted to fund and our Finance Committee is investigating options for how to fund the next HVAC system that needs replacement. In addition to the Proposed Operating budget for next year, the Finance Committee has also created an Infrastructure Projects and Repair budget that prioritizes projects and budgets for costs out to 2026. We are close to paying off the mortgage for the building and refinancing or taking out an Equity Line of credit might be a good way for us to go to take care of our old building. We will be presenting both budgets during the Stewardship Drive and will be seeking approval for the final budget and the decision on how to move forward to address our infrastructure needs at our Annual Congregational Meeting that will occur on June 5.

The kickoff activity for our Stewardship campaign will occur on Saturday, March 19. It will be held in combination with a celebration of St. Patrick's Day. Not only will we be looking for that pot of money, but we will also be looking for people to fill the vacancies we have in our valuable committees. RE is also looking for additional volunteers. Now that we are experiencing a reprieve from Covid, now is the time for all our committees to blossom in the Springtime! Please consider where you would like to offer your participation. Pastoral Care? Audiovisual Team? Communications Committee? Building & Grounds? All are looking for new members. It is a great way to get to know people in our community better.

The Board is also in the process of completing an assessment of Rev. Charlotte. The Assessment Team is comprised of Cathy Ring, Dianne Lane, Martha Muirhead and Randy Earl. Please make a point of giving them your feedback.

As I finish up this report, I have to say that with the new information given by the CDC regarding community metrics (that are based on the number of new daily cases and the percentage of hospital admissions), Prince William County's Covid risk level is LOW. New daily cases dropped to 2.6 per 100,000 people. This is terrific news! We will most likely be making some changes in our reopening plans, so stay tuned.
