Faithfully Becoming an Aspiring, Inspiring and Conspiring Community

Historically, our faith tradition has been characterized by the trappings of academia. Although we worship and serve together year-round, we still function, at least nominally, on an academic calendar. With September, we celebrate coming back together after our summer forays; our **Water Communion (on 9/10)** invites us to bring a little water to contribute in a ritual of ingathering and community. This water symbolizes our being fully a part of nature and the cycles thereof. It also symbolizes our being integrally part of this UU congregational community. <u>Everyone</u> is invited to participate and I will make sure there is some water that those who forget their water or didn't know about this ritual will use to be fully involved in the worship experience.

With the start of September, you will notice that we have a lot in the works for this year. The Board has a full plate of projects that we are continuing to move forward on. I urge each and every one of BRUU's members and friends to be actively involved and contributing to the development of our strategic planning and potential organizational restructuring. Being informed and sharing your own thoughts and perspectives are critical to the ultimate success of these initiatives which were launched last year.

During my visit to Minneapolis to see my mother, my siblings and some of our extended family, Mom and I made a habit of playing Scrabble. She couldn't find her Scrabble set, which she had put in the Community Room where she lives, and so she brought the one she was able to find there back to her apartment for us to play with. After our second game, we realized that there weren't the requisite number of one of the letters; so, we decided to go through and figure out what was missing. It turned out to be quite a few different vowels and one "W." This reality caused our wondering about the impact of not having all of the letters available for play.

This wondering has led me to the analogy that if we are missing *your voice* as we move ahead towards, through and into new ways of being – of faithfully becoming a new and improved "community of seeking and service" in this changed world in which we are now living – we will not be as successful as we intend to be. Oh, it is clear that we can function well enough without your contributions – both Mom and I played the game well, as well as we could with what we had in hand – but we won't be able to achieve our full potential at this time in history if you aren't part of the mix.

After attending a wonderful outdoor worship service in Minneapolis, I am intentionally recommitting to being actively involved in communities that aspire, inspire, and conspire to change the world. Those three words all have as part of their roots, the Latin word for breath - *spir* - and can also refer to "having a longing for" as well as "soul." It is my hope to see, accompany and participate in our BRUU community making a similar commitment to faithfully becoming an aspirational, inspirational and conspiratorial community that leads - locally and more expansively - in defending freedom and human rights for all people.

To this end, please be sure to attend the September 17th worship service being lead by our General Assembly Delegate Team which will share how UUs across the country and throughout the world are "Faithfully Becoming," including how the UUA's by-laws Article II language may change with the future 2nd vote on this section of the document, **and** the BRUU Town Hall meeting immediately following the service to begin the congregation's discernment processes relative to creating beneficial organizational restructuring, implementing our strategic plan and living our vision.

Your voice, your participation, your "Scrabble letter" is a critical contribution to the mix of our whole community and its ministries.




COVID 19 Policy Update

The BRUU Board has been watching the COVID19 community transmission levels and based on current rates on <u>https://covid.cdc.gov/covid-data-tracker/#datatracker-home</u>, we have achieved a low risk level in our community for an extended period of time.

We still strongly recommend COVID19 Vaccinations and Boosters stay up to date according to the CDC recommendations on <u>https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/vaccines/stay-up-to-date.html</u>.

We are no longer checking vaccinations at the door.

Any changes to this policy will be determined based on the above CDC data, and we will revisit policies on a Biannual schedule or as needed.





CLIMATE CHANGE UPDATE

All 24 jurisdictions in the Metropolitan Washington Council of Governments (MWCOG) <u>agreed in 2020 to cut greenhouse</u> gas emissions by 2030 to 50% of the 2005 level.

MWCOG has completed inventories for each of those jurisdictions. Now, any advocate of sustainability can measure progress - or lack of progress - by looking at numbers.

But where are the numbers? Prince William County is preparing a Community Energy and Sustainability Master Plan (<u>CESMP</u>), and the <u>Greenhouse Gas Reduction Scenario</u> is available for review. Randy Freed chairs the county's Sustainability Commission, and he can add more details - just ask..

Manassas has a task force working to draft a climate action plan. Mike Freeland is on that task force, and you can see about its activities <u>online</u>.

At the moment, Manassas Park has not started to draft an action plan to meet the 2030 target.

Tell Congress to Advance a Climate-Smart Farm Bill In 2023



We have a critical opportunity to advocate for a climate-smart agricultural sector that advances justice. The five-year proposal now being drafted offers the chance to reduce hunger, promote environmental stewardship and promote fairness to all farmers and farmworkers. Our UU values call on us to advocate for a Farm Bill that brings about fairness, especially to farmers and farm workers of color who have been left out of earlier bills, and that encourages production of sustainably grown, healthful food rather than commodity crops grown in ways that deplete soil and pollute our waterways.

The current Farm Bill expires on September 30, 2023, so both the House and Senate are actively working on drafting a new five-year Farm Bill.
